We will recruit participants and conduct or participate in 10 community events with our partners to provide ongoing engagement around the project. We need to provide creative ways for residents to offer their talents in creating a healthier community; help them self-identify what they are interested in and connecting them with resources to strengthen interests, creating health advocates in the process; and improve the public perception of the community by identifying individuals and families who are positively engaged in making the community healthier and provide them with positive recognition for themselves, their families and their work.
