This year we advertised meetings in the MSR, put a flier in the Southside Pride, Newsletter was bilingual, Door knocking with Fluent Spanish speakers, MN Sure event with translators. We also used Billboard signage and advertised events with other SUN participant organizations.

Did you find any strategies to be particularly successful? Why?

We did not find any to be an outstanding change in turn out at events. The community Garden has had a very consistent turn out of people and they have all been dedicated.

What did not work so well? Why?

We still get a smaller turn out to events than we wish.

We have reached out to over 150 people through these activities.

We have had over 20 volunteers

After the Seward coop said they were opening a new coop in Bryant, we had many meetings and realized there were broad concerns around gentrification, the Bryant neighborhood took the lead on finding out the desires of our residents and worked to secure moving of houses versus demolition from the development site. This was a very long process involving CPED, GMHC, and the BNO to find good lots, determining which houses were suitable, figuring out how to move a house coordinating with the Seward coops deadlines, costs for the projects etc. We looked at many sites in the surrounding area. Though the BNO wished for a house move to occur in Bryant, there were no appropriate lots found. Both houses were moved into the Central neighborhood on 35th and Columbus and on 35th & Chicago Avenue South. The BNO was proud to make these moves happen; the houses will be sold to low income families and will help keep some of the housing stock affordable into the future. Both houses will be rehabbed this spring.

Out of the house moving process a lot on the corner of 39th and Columbus Avenue South that has been vacant for more than a decade and owned by public works was deemed un-developable due to a high water table. The BNO had asked to lease this lot over three years to use it as a community garden. We were turned down multiple times. Well, once we were told a house could not be moved there, we enlisted the help of Council Member Glidden's office and were granted access to the lot.

We are planning to start our community garden this spring and have a committed group of residents who will be the governance committee and have been working diligently to get this going. We have heard from our Phase 2 plan that a community garden was wanted.

We are hoping it is a bridge between renters and homeowners as well as a place for all our residents will work hand in hand to grow produce for their family and neighbors.

We have been working diligently to get to the table with the Seward Coop to strengthen our neighborhood by trying to keep as many dollars local as possible. We anticipate this can be accomplished by hiring from within the community, trying to diversify the store so it is a comfortable place for all our residents to shop. We are consistently sharing information on what the BNO is doing and interesting things going on in the area.
