neighborhood revitalization and beautification. During the last week of June, over 70 volunteers, provided minor repairs to homes on Irving Avenue, Between 30th and Lowry Avenue North. On Saturday, June 30th, the community gathered to celebrate; 150+ residents, several elected officials, local entertainers and 25+ vendors participated in a health and resource fair. JACC used this gathering as an opportunity to survey residents about safety and housing strategies and gather their support to allocate NRP funding. JACC partnered with North Hennepin Community College and Metro State University to host The Truth About Drugs with Dr. Joy Degruy, author of Post Traumatic Slave Syndrome, as the guest speaker. JACC was invited by Mayor Jacob Frey to participate as part of the mayor's opioid task force, composed of several community members and health professionals to look at methods and strategies to address the opioid epidemic and its impact on communities of color, especially African Americans and Native Americans. JACC continues to partner with other Northside agencies by meeting monthly as a member of Northside Neighborhood Council (NNC). JACC partnered with Hawthorne Neighborhood Council (HNC) to host National Night Out and their Winter Warmth initiative to provide winter clothes and gear to children. JACC continues to support community events by having a booth and tabling at Flow and Open Streets. In 2018, JACC board, staff and a community member traveled to Denver to attend the Healing Justice Alliance conference. An annual conference that brings professionals together to share best practices centered around violence as a public health issue.

#### Other activities (please describe here):

Over the past 6 years, JACC has been selected to be an employer of the City of Minneapolis Step up program. In the summer of 2018, JACC hired 4 youth interns, ages 14-15 years of age. The youth coordinated a college tour of the University of Minnesota and a culture day at Karmel Mall. To bridge cultural gaps and increase engagement in under-represented groups, JACC hired outreach staff to focus on engaging South East Asian, African American and East African residents. JACC partnered with Insight News to do live podcasts, and radio interviews in English and Hmong languages. During the era of the Me-Too Movement, in its Fall 2018 newsletter, the JACC Flash, the agency highlighted six women community leaders who have faced great adversity and asked the question, what motivates you? JACC outreach team created a plan to outreach to Jordan renters and businesses. A partnership was formed with the management team of Broadway Flats, a 103 unit apt building, located at Penn & West Broadway to door knock the building and host onsite community meetings. Urban neighborhoods like Jordan, tend to have lower rates of employment and educational attainment and are plagued with other social and health disparities. Community members in violent neighborhoods often acquiesce to the violence, accepting it as "normal" behavior and feeling powerless to stop it. Jordan Area Community Council and Jordan residents believe it is the right time to take a stand and the idea for communities to band together is long overdue to address crime block by block. Jordan residents, the Minneapolis Police department and other community stakeholders held monthly safety meetings at the Davis Center and North Regional library, after a shooting occurred, to develop a neighborhood safety plan. JACC created a youth scholarship, Doing Good in the Hood, to recognize youth ages 15+. JACC created the Star Neighbor Award to allow residents to recognize someone in the community and/or on their block. JACC surveyed community members regarding needs of the community. Based upon feed back, funding was allocated to implement a senior loan program and a business grant.

Over the past 5 years, the Jordan neighborhood has consistently been a community earmarked by media and law enforcement as having the highest incidents of crime among all the Northside neighborhoods. JACC made a commitment to create opportunities to generate ideas around how and why violence remains concentrated in certain socially and economically deprived neighborhoods and create a venue for residents to test and implement solutions. Over the past year, Jordan residents, the Minneapolis Police department and other community stakeholders have met to continue to take a stand against gun violence by asking the question, what does it take to resolve issues without gun violence.
